About this Service

The Ordination of Women in the Episcopal Church

Through most of the history of the Christian Church the position of women has been secondary to that of men. During the first half of the twentieth century, as women in the Episcopal Church were seeking to expand their participation in the life of the church, many women became directors of religious education as "deaconesses"—a separate order from male deacons.

The movement for ordination equity gained momentum in 1970 when laywomen were seated for the first time with voting rights at General Convention. A resolution called for eliminating the canonical distinctions between male deacons and female deaconesses. When that motion was adopted, the Episcopal Church was presented with the issue of whether to ordain women as priests and bishops too.

By July 1974, supporters of women's ordination grew restless with the stalled legislative process and a service was scheduled to ordain women to the priesthood. Three retired bishops agreed to preside: Daniel Corrigan, retired bishop suffragan of Colorado; Robert L. DeWitt, recently resigned Bishop of Pennsylvania; and Edward R. Welles, retired Bishop of West Missouri.

Eleven female deacons presented themselves as ready for ordination to the priesthood. These women, who came to be called the "Philadelphia Eleven," were Merrill Bittner, Alla Bozarth-Campbell, Alison Cheek, Emily Hewitt, Carter Heyward, Suzanne Hiatt, Marie Moorefield, Jeannette Piccard, Betty Schiess, Katrina Swanson, and Nancy Wittig. They were ordained on July 29, 1974 at the Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The ordinations inspired both celebration and controversy in the Episcopal Church.







If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.






